To whom it may concern:

I, **Amezcua Jurado David** (the *handler*), respectfully state that **Rocket** is a **Service Dog** trained to perform specific tasks that **mitigate a disability** of the handler. Rocket is **trained to behave appropriately in public**, to remain **under the handler's control** at all times (leash/harness or effective voice/hand control), and is **housebroken**.

Access request: Under **applicable accessibility laws** —e.g., in the **United States**, the *Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)*, Titles II & III (28 C.F.R. § 35.136 and § 36.302(c)); and in **Mexico**, the *Ley General para la Inclusión de las Personas con Discapacidad* and local rules— the establishment is requested to **allow Rocket to accompany the handler in all public areas** open to patrons.

Note (ADA): Staff may **only ask two questions**: (1) whether the dog is a service animal required because of a disability; and (2) **what work or task** the dog has been trained to perform. They **may not** require documentation, demand task demonstrations, or charge pet fees. This letter is provided **voluntarily** as a courtesy.

Task statement (privacy): For **privacy** reasons, the handler chooses **not to disclose** the specific tasks in this document. Under the ADA, staff may only ask the two permissible questions; **no** official documentation or task demonstration is required. This letter is a courtesy notice.

Handler commitments: The dog will remain under control; the handler is responsible for the dog's behavior and will remove the dog if it becomes disruptive; vaccinations are current and the dog is trained for public settings.
